

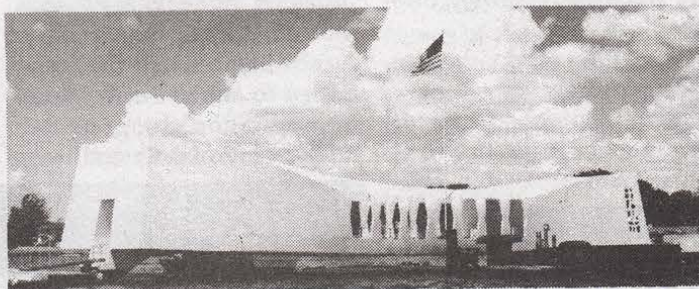

PHSA Memorial Monument And Plaque Dedication At U.S. Coast Guard Academy

The US Coast Guard Academy, lying high in the mountainous terrain overlooking the Thames River from its easterly banks at New London, Connecticut, was host on October 15, 1993 to the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association.

The occasion on this, the 203rd Anniversary year of the US Coast Guard, marked the presentation to the Academy and the dedication of the granite Memorial Monument with its bronze plaque recognizing and honoring the sacrifice of the 2,403 who were lost in the Japanese attack on the military stations on the Island of Oahu on December 7, 1941.

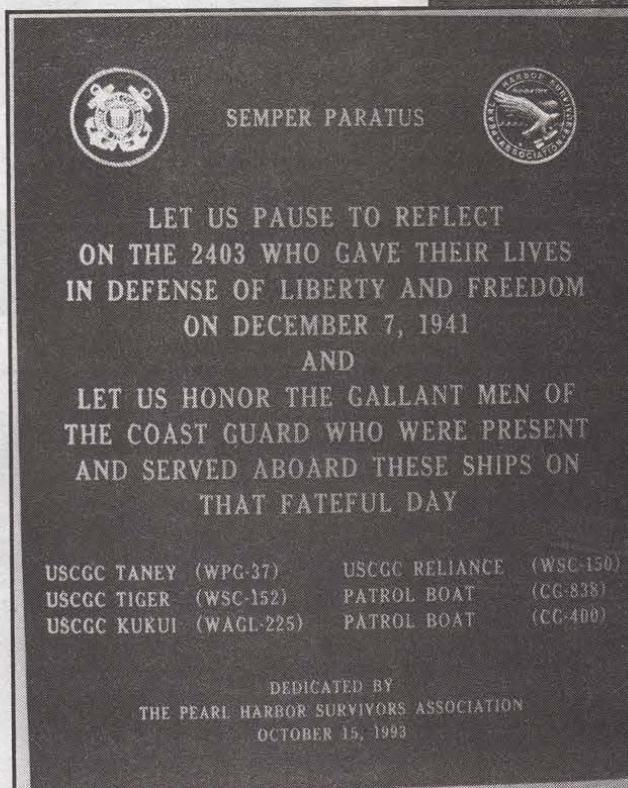
Rear Admiral Paul E. Versaw, the Academy Superintendent, and his entire staff made each event of this momentous occasion memorable, beginning on Friday, October 15, 1993 with over 200 Survivors and Guests attending a luncheon at the Officer's Club dining room with President Lee Goldfarb as Toastmaster and Master of Ceremonies. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by National Treasurer Bill Eckel and the prayer was offered by National Secretary Jay Finnern.

The Memorial Service, led

by the Academy Chaplains, was held immediately afterward in the Academy Chapel, climaxed by the Memorial address given by Vice President Robert (Mac) McClintock.

Below the Chapel in the very new Memorial Garden, Admiral Versaw and President Goldfarb made the presentation and acceptance, after which

they placed a beautiful wreath at the base of the Monument. The Memorial Monument stands on the high side of the reflecting pool with its water jets

giving emphasis to the beautiful surrounding garden with its walls and balustrades of Connecticut stone.

The Pearl Harbor Survivors were the special guests at the very colorful Corps of Cadets Regimental

Parade, at which our National President Lee Goldfarb and Mr. John A. Church, a prominent past-president of the US Coast Guard Foundation, were the reviewing officials.

This affair marks the last of our project to place a Memorial Monument and/or Plaque at each of the four Military Academies.

The Eighth District Convention, with Tom Nerkowski the Convention Coordinator, was held coincident with the memorial events, and provided valuable assistance in smoothing the many details that enabled the committee to achieve success in this dedication.

responsible for the success of this project, consisted of: National President Lee Goldfarb; 8th District Director Art Schreier; 7th District Director George Danko; NJ State Chairman Leo Harkins; NJ Chapter 2 Treasurer Jack Martin.

National President's Message

The USS Pearl Harbor will be built at the Avondale Shipyards in New Orleans, LA. The tentative date for the Dedication Ceremonies is July 1996. I would suggest we all stay healthy at least till that date.

In my last conversation with the Office of the Postmaster General I learned that we are still very much in the running for a Pearl Harbor Commemorative Stamp in 1995—the conclusion of the 50th Anniversary events of World War II.

On November 11th I had the honor of being invited to the White House to have breakfast with the President. In addition I was present when the President placed a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

One additional event I was able to attend was the services held by the Virginia Survivors. Frank Costagliola, Veterans Affairs Liaison Committee Chairman, was a very gracious host. On the previous day National Capitol Liaison Committee Chairman Tony DiLorenzo and I

walked the halls of Congress seeking co-sponsors for House Resolution 150 (the Kimmel and Short Resolution) and House Resolution 131 (the bill making December 7 a National Day of Remembrance). When Congress reconvenes we will be there again.

We ask all of you to contact your Congressmen locally and ask them to co-sponsor.

Finally, I feel very badly that there are conflicts among some of the Survivors in District One, District Six, and District Eight. I would suggest to you that with a diminishing list of Survivors brought about by attrition we re-examine our priorities and try our best to be more amicable.

This message is being written prior to the Holidays and perhaps if we would try to live up to the meaning of the Season then the words "Peace on Earth and Good Will to All" will apply to all of us. A belated Happy Holiday to All.

National Secretary's Message

The Handbook revision is complete and copies have been sent to all State Chairmen for distribution to each chapter. If you desire a 1993 Handbook revision for your chapter vice president or for your own personal copy, please send your request along with a \$10.00 check or money order payable to the PHSA, Inc. to the National Administrative Office.

It should be noted that 24 pages were deleted, such as 16-4, 5, 6 and 7. All the information on these pages was transferred to Appendix A. This produced a savings of \$85.00. All changes produced a savings of \$510.00.

Other deletions, such as the map of district alignment were felt to be redundant as the districts are clearly defined in Section I, page I-I, and in Article V of NCBL. Renumbering sections and the letter of some appendixes may cause some confusion. If they become long term, they will be revised in 1996-1997, which is the date of the next scheduled Handbook revision.

The assistance provided by your Vice President, Robert McClintock, and Treasurer, William Eckel, during the revision process was invaluable. For this we thank them.

The most appreciated person in this entire process of revising the Constitution and By-Laws and Handbook is my wife and indispensable right arm, Inge, who applied her typing skills to the entire

process. Many thanks to her for an excellent job well done.

Be kind and appreciate one another while there is yet time. From January 1, 1993, to December 1, 1993, 577 survivors have reported to the Supreme Commander. Communication between the surviving spouses and the chapter officers or lack thereof is the primary cause of our Death Notice problem. In your meetings, newsletters or other chapter-wide mailing, PLEASE remind the survivors and spouses to communicate with either the Chapter Officers or the National Administrative Office after the death of a spouse.

Remember, at our age we are entitled to forget.

The Administrative Office would also appreciate a change of address when it occurs. Forwarding time can expire for those survivors who receive First Class mailing and your GRAM is then sent to the Administrative Office. Each time the Post Office forwards your GRAM it costs the association 35 cents.

Grievances:

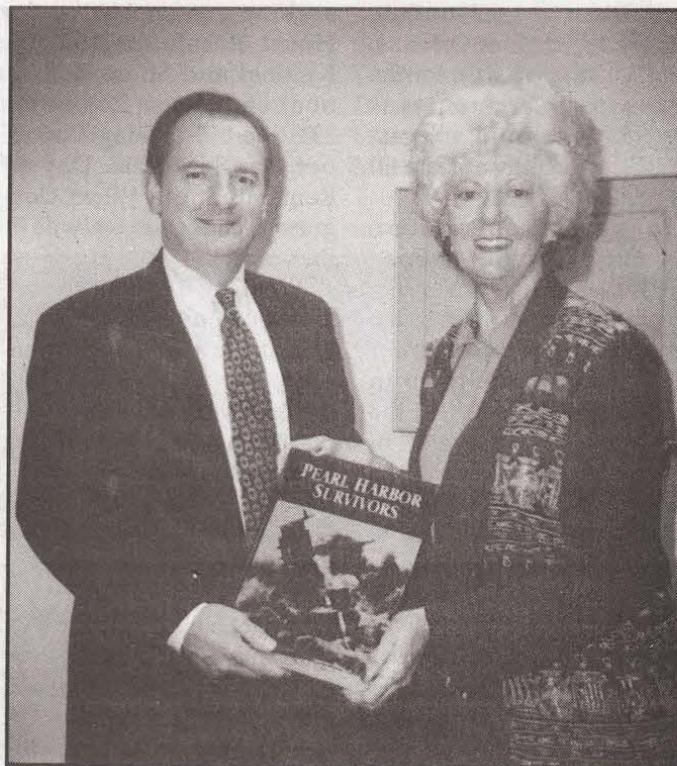

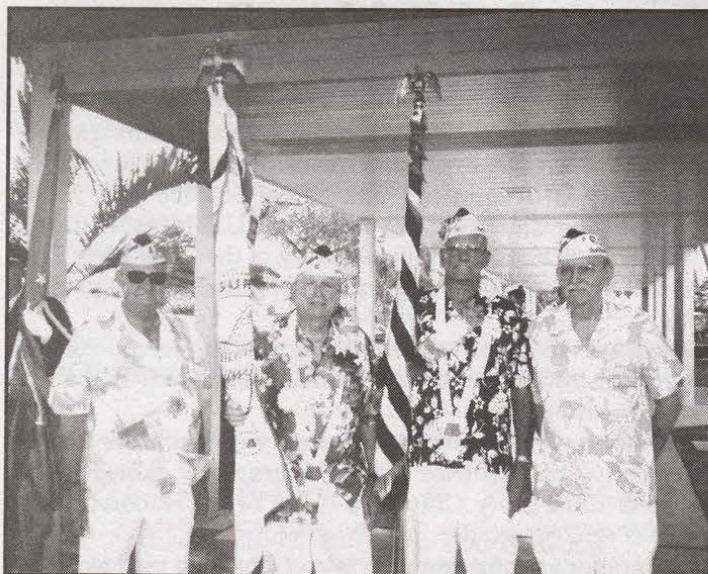

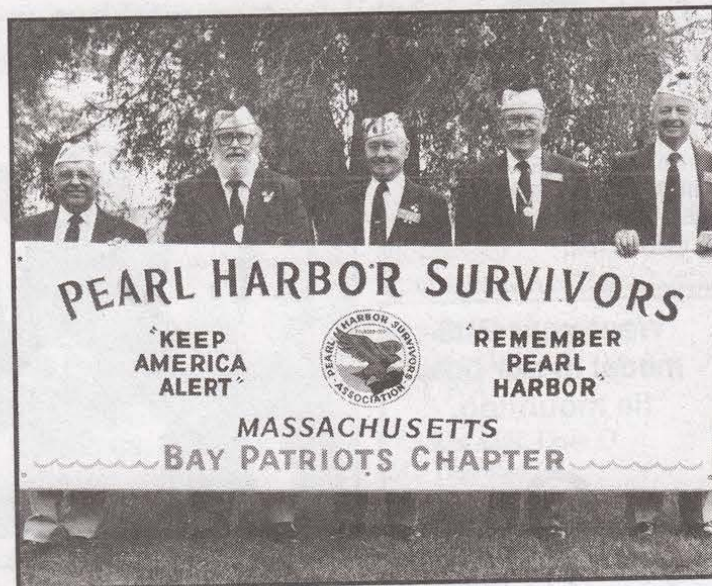

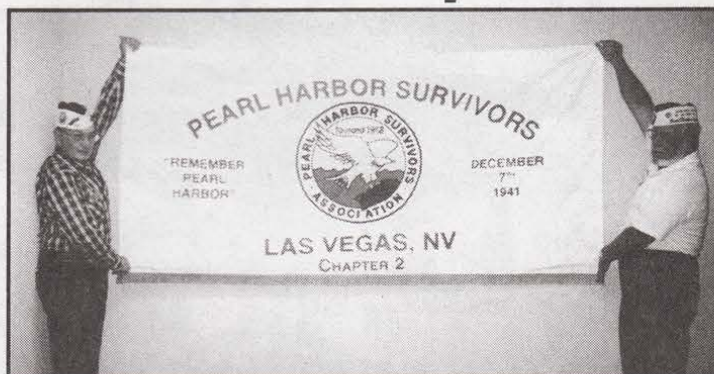

He served faithfully in the U.S. Army during World War II as a commanding officer of the 78th Infantry Division. He also served during the Korean War. He lived in Las Cruces, New Mexico at the time of his death.

He is survived by his wife, Emily, one son, three daughters and six grandchildren.

ALVIN W. AMY, born Feb. 23, 1921 in Lake Charles, LA. Graduated from Opelousas High School in Louisiana. Enlisted in the Navy on March 25, 1941.

Attended recruit training in San Diego, CA and radio aviation radio school at NAS San Diego.

Served aboard the USS *Maryland* from 1941 to 1944. Was on the topside, forward, portside scuddebutting with Dutch Holderline and Harley Gynnn when the Japs attacked on that infamous Dec. 7, 1941.



He served in the 5th Division until promoted to S1c, then decided he wanted to pursue radio again. Transferred to the CR division and later promoted to RM3c. Transferred to PC(C) a new commissioned ship. He served as radioman until his discharge April 5, 1946.

After separation from the Navy, went to work for Superior Oil Company as senior accountant until retiring in December 1984.

Member of USS *Maryland* National Veterans Association and the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association.

JOSEPH J. RYAN, born in Pittsford, NY Dec. 8, 1917. Attended school in New York City and was graduated from high school in June 1937. After graduation he worked as a "hard-rock" miner on the Delaware Aqueduct, a water tunnel running from the Delaware water shed to New York City.

In November 1940, he joined the Navy for a six year hitch. He graduated from Boot Camp at Newport, RI, then attended radio school at San Diego for 16 weeks. He left in August 1941 for Pearl Harbor on the USS *Argonne*. He was assigned to the Flag of COMTRAINRON Eight on the USS *Antares* at Pearl.

In October 1941, the *Antares* was sent to Palmyra and Ryan was transferred with the Flag compliment to the USS *Argonne* until the return of the *Antares*. Since he was a Radio Striker, and not needed in the radio shack, he and Bill Brady, also a Striker, were assigned to a new Captain's gig to ready it for the return of the *Antares*. The coxswain was named Ski. They sanded and varnished the gig for about a month and were inspected by 1st Lt. Grimm on December 6. He then assigned them to meet the *Antares*, with the new captain's gig, when she entered Pearl Harbor Dec. 7 around 7:30 am. On that morning they were standing-by on the quarter deck of the *Argonne* at 1010 dock just having finished breakfast. At about 7:55 AM they saw a hangar blow sky high on Ford Island. Within seconds many torpedo planes with the Rising Sun meatballs flew down the channel from Mary's Point heading straight for battleship row.

Ryan was ordered to carry .50 caliber ammunition to topside where Marines were manning the machine guns. They showed him how to make belts of .50s with a machine that pushed the shells through metal loops. Not having a helmet he was ordered below and while in the Officer's Country, was ordered to throw all wooden furniture overboard. Their gig was finally called away and they were ordered to aid the *Nevada* by removing the wounded and ferrying them to Hospital Point. Until early afternoon they continued to pick up survivors around the harbor and then helped tow a barge with pumps to Raleigh on

the other side of Ford Island.

At sunset, when American planes came in gunners from battleship row opened fire. Tracers hit their gig and the *Argonne*. Ryan was issued a Springfield rifle and was ordered to stay on 1010 dock and repel any Japs.

Ryan returned to the states in August 1942 and was assigned to the USS *Denver* CL-58. Ryan left *Denver* in May 1945 at Subic Bay, Philippines and was at Pier 90, New York City when Japan surrendered. He was honorably discharged from the Sub Base at New London, CT in November 1946 as a Radioman 1/C.



Ryan married his childhood sweetheart, Harriet A. Harrigan, on Nov. 10, 1942 in Troy, NY. She was a registered nurse at Watervliet Arsenal. They have two sons, Joseph and Dennis. Ryan graduated from Paul Smith's College in May 1949 with a pre-legal degree, graduated from Boston University School of Law in May 1952 with an LLB Degree and was admitted to the Massachusetts Bar that same year and the New York Bar in 1953. He was employed as an attorney for the Surface Transit, Inc. and Fifth Avenue Coach Co. for many years. He moved back to Northern New York in 1962 and opened a Law Office in Chateaugay, NY. He was appointed the first Public Defender in 1965 for Franklin County until 1977 when he was elected District Attorney for Franklin County, NY. Retired in 1983 as District Attorney. Was appointed to General Counsel for the PHSA in 1988 and still holds that position. Ryan practices law at his home and enjoys a semi-retired status.

Last Recruit Companies Graduate From San Diego Naval Training Center

At 11:00 A.M. on Friday, November 19, 1993 seven companies of approximately 77 recruits each passed in review for the last time. The Naval Training Center will not accept any more recruits, as the base will ultimately close in 1999.

Chapter 3 member, 88-year-old Cecil Spencer, was a recruit in the second company to train in San Diego in 1924, the year the Training Center opened for business. He was invited to attend the last graduation as a VIP, but an injury to his foot kept him away. More than 5,000 people were on hand to witness the 2082nd recruit graduation. 35 Pearl Harbor Survivors, with wives and friends were in the reserved section of the grandstand to say goodbye to NTC.



Chapter 3's John Finn, a Medal of Honor winner from NAS Kaneohe Bay, was among the dignitaries present. The 84-year-old Finn received his award from Fleet Admiral Chester Nimitz on board the USS Enterprise in Pearl Harbor, September 15, 1942.

Finn went through "Boot Camp" in San Diego 60 years ago. He is honored yet in another way at NTC as a building is named in his honor, "The John Finn Hall".

During the last few years, Chapter 3 has taken an active part by sponsoring a number of Recruit Companies. Former National President, Ken Crease and current National President, Lee Goldfarb and Chapter 3's Gordon Jones, all have been invited as a "Guest of Honor", for recruit graduations. We can be justifiably proud that the PHSA has been involved at NTC and the memories of these young men will always be with us.

History Of USS Worden (DD-352)

John Lorimer Worden was born in Worchester County, New York on 12 March 1818. He was appointed a Midshipman on 10 January 1834 and served three years on the sloop of war ERIE on Brazil Station, followed by brief service in the sloop of war CYNE and seven months at the Naval School at Philadelphia. He had duty with the Pacific Squadron (1840-1842), the Naval Observatory (1844-1846) and spent the Mexican War in the store ship SOUTH-HAMPTON and other ships on the West Coast.

He was again at the Naval Observatory (1850-1852) and the next ten years were filled with cruises in the Mediterranean and the Caribbean Seas. Ordered to Washington just before the outbreak of the Civil War, he was sent south on 7 April 1861 with secret orders to the squadron at Pensacola for the reinforcement of Fort Pickens.

Worden was arrested on his return journey near Montgomery, Alabama, and held prisoner for seven months until released in a prisoner exchange. He had not fully recovered from the illness brought on by his confinement on 16 January 1862 when ordered to report to command the ironclad MONITOR, building at Greenpoint, Long Island. After the supervision of her completion, he made the rough passage down the coast, beset by difficulties brought about in the experimental construction of his ironclad. These were later declared by him to have been as great a hazard to overcome as those of the subsequent battle.

Worden brought MONITOR into Hampton Roads shortly after nightfall of 8 March 1862 and all hands spent the night in preparation for meeting the Confed-



erate ironclad VIRGINIA (formerly USS MERRIMACK) the next day.

In the battle, vital for the maintenance of the northern blockade and revolutionary for its influence on naval design, Worden had his station in the pilot house, forward of the turret. Three hours of fighting left Worden wounded in the face and nearly blinded by a shell which exploded just outside. The command of MONITOR was taken over by his first officer, Lieutenant Samuel D. Green, but when the ironclad returned after a temporary withdrawal, the VIRGINIA had retired from the action.

For heroism displayed and the great service rendered in this action, Worden was tendered a vote of thanks by Congress and promoted from Commander to Captain on 3 February 1863. After recovery he took command of the monitor MONTAUK in the South Atlantic Blockading Squadron, engaging on 27 January 1863, a four-hour action with Fort McAllister. A month later he destroyed, by five well-placed shots, the Confederate cruiser NASHVILLE under the guns of this fort. His ironclad was struck fourteen times during the

attack on Charleston, 7 April 1863.

Shortly after this action, Worden was assigned to ironclad construction work at New York. He was Superintendent of the United States Naval Academy (1869-1874), and for the next two years was in command of the European Squadron, visiting ports of Northern Europe and cruising in the Eastern Mediterranean during the Russo-Turkish War. Thereafter, he was a member of the Examining Board and President of the Retiring Board until his voluntary retirement on 23 December 1886, when Congress awarded him for life the full sea pay of his grade. He made his home in Washington, D.C., where he died of pneumonia on 19 October 1897. Rear Admiral Worden was interred at Pawling, New York, after funeral services in the St. John's Episcopal Church, Washington, D.C.

WORDEN (DD-352), third ship of this name, was built by the Puget Sound Navy Yard, Bremerton, Washington. Her keel was laid 29 December 1932 and she was launched on 27 October 1934, under the sponsorship of Mrs. John Halligan. The

destroyer was placed in commission on 15 January 1935, Commander Robert E. Kerr, USN, in command.

WORDEN got under way from the Puget Sound Navy Yard on 1 April 1935 for a shakedown cruise, which took her by the way of San Diego, thence along the coast of lower California and Mexico to San Jose, Guatemala, and Puntarenas, Costa Rica. She transited the Panama Canal on 6 May enroute to Washington, D.C., where on 17 May she embarked Rear Admiral Joseph K. Taussig, Assistant Chief of Naval Operations, along with a congressional party for a cruise on the Potomac River to Mount Vernon. Her guns were disassembled for alterations in the Washington Navy Yard before she shifted to the Norfolk Navy Yard on 21 May for voyage repairs intervened by trials and tests off Rockland, Maine. She cleared the Norfolk Yard on 1 July to spend the Fourth of July weekend at New Bedford, Massachusetts, then set course by way of Guantanamo Bay and the Panama Canal for return to the Puget Sound Navy Yard on 3 August 1935.

WORDEN arrived at San Diego on 19 September 1935 and began four years of service from that base as a unit of Destroyer Squadrons, Scouting Force. She performed valuable duty as a training ship for the Fleet Sound School of San Diego, taking time out for tactics and independent ship exercises in local waters, and maneuvers which found her in waters as far north as Seward, Alaska, and as far south as Callao, Peru. She also participated in the regular schedule of fleet problems and battle tactics with combined forces in the Caribbean Sea and off the Hawaiian Islands. On 5 October 1939 she sailed from San Diego with the Hawaiian Fleet Detachment to permanently base at Pearl Harbor.

WORDEN was in upkeep

status alongside destroyer tender DOBBIN (AD-3) the morning of 7 December 1941. The explosion of an enemy bomb some fifty yards astern gave WORDEN a good shaking, but she suffered no damage. One of her gunners, Quartermaster Third Class Raymond Harvey Brubaker, trained his .50 caliber machine gun on a low flying bomber and had the satisfaction of seeing this enemy crash and explode in the sea.

Under way for open sea within two hours after the attack began, WORDEN sent seven depth charges exploding into the sea on a submarine contact at 1240, then became a part of the anti-submarine screen around cruiser DETROIT in a search which took her to the southwest of Oahu. In these waters she found fleet oiler NEOSHO, and helped escort her to a fueling rendezvous with aircraft carrier LEXINGTON

(CV-2), the flagship of Rear Admiral Fitch's Task Force Eleven.

WORDEN took a screening station on LEXINGTON'S bow the early morning of 11 December 1941, and the next night, she hurried NEOSHO away from danger as destroyer DEWEY moved in on a surfaced enemy submarine. After seeing the fleet oiler into the safety of Pearl Harbor she was under way on 14 December with the LEXINGTON task force to relieve Wake Island. That beleaguered garrison fell on 23 December 1941, and WORDEN returned for offensive patrol off the Hawaiian Islands. She attacked an enemy submarine a few hours before the midnight of 26 December for unknown results and dropped depth charges on suspected submarines while operating with the LEXINGTON carrier task force off Oahu on 16 and 22 January 1942.

WORDEN was detached from the LEXINGTON carrier task force on 31 January 1942. She cleared Pearl Harbor on 5 February to escort seaplane tender CURTISS (AY-4), and fleet oiler PLATTE (AO-24) by way of the Samoan and Fiji Islands to Noumea, New Caledonia. They reached the last named port on the 21st. Three days later the merchant ship SNARK struck a mine in Bulari Passage and WORDEN quickly passed a line to tow that sinking ship clear of the channel entrance, treating six injured men of the SNARK and bringing her crew into port. She was under way from Noumea on 7 March 1942, and set course with CURTISS for return to Pearl Harbor on the 19th. WORDEN entered the Pearl Harbor Navy Yard that same day for repairs and rejoined Rear Admiral Aubrey W. Fitch's LEXINGTON carrier

task force on 14 April 1942.

WORDEN cleared Pearl Harbor on 15 April 1942 and steamed with the LEXINGTON task force to an ocean area to the southwest of the New Hebrides Islands where on 1 May, rendezvous was made with the YORKTOWN task force under Rear Admiral Frank Jack Fletcher. After the two carrier forces fueled on 3 May, WORDEN was detached to escort fleet oiler TIPPECANOE (AO-21) to the safety of Noumea, New Caledonia.

WORDEN reached Noumea on 10 May 1942 and was joined in that port two days later by the cruisers and destroyers of the former LEXINGTON task force. She put to sea with a part of this group on 13 May and was off Efate, New Hebrides Islands, the next day to join Task Force SIXTEEN which included ENTERPRISE and HORNET. The task force entered Pearl Harbor on 26 May and put to sea 28 May 1942 to participate in the defense of Midway.

The Japanese armada was encountered the morning of 4 June 1942 and WORDEN guarded the ENTERPRISE and HORNET while their divebombers and those of the YORKTOWN sent three enemy carriers to the bottom of the sea with an assist from the fleet submarine NAUTILUS. Near the noon hour of 4 June, WORDEN observed the last fight of carrier YORKTOWN who was left dead in the water by three direct bomb hits after fighting off 18 enemy dive bombers and an equal number of fighters from the Japanese carrier HIRYU. Her planes continued the battle from ENTERPRISE and HORNET to assist in the attacks which sent the HIRYU to the bottom of the sea.

HORNET wrote the finish to one of the decisive battles of history on 6 June 1942 when her planes left Japanese cruiser MOGAMI aflame and heavily damaged.

WORDEN returned to Pearl Harbor on 13 June 1942 and was assigned as a screening unit for aircraft carrier SARATOGA (CV-3), the flagship of Task Force ELEVEN. After cruising off Midway where SARATOGA flew off one squadron each of Army and Marine fighter planes for reinforcement of that island, she engaged in battle practice in the Hawaiian area. On 9 July WORDEN steamed south with the SARATOGA task force, being temporarily detached the 21st to escort oiler PLATTE to Noumea, New Caledonia. She reached the last named port on 25 July and took up a listening station for enemy submarines in the entrance to the Great Roads anchorage while the oiler took on a vital new cargo for replenishment of the carrier forces. The two warships stood out of port on 28 July and that night WORDEN closed signal lights to take on board thirty-six survivors of United States Army Transport Number 42, formerly the Dutch ship TJINEGARA which had been torpedoed and sunk about 75 miles southwest of Noumea.

WORDEN rejoined the SARATOGA to the south of the Fiji Islands on 29 July 1942 when the carrier forces combined with Marine-laden transports which had sailed from Wellington, New Zealand for the invasion of the Solomon Islands. She was temporarily diverted as escort for fleet oiler CIMARON to Noumea where she landed the survivors of TJINEGARA on 1 August 1942. Two days later she

caught up with the combined Task Force SIXTY-ONE whose transport ships carried some 20,000 Marines.

Shortly before daybreak of 7 August 1942, WORDEN was screening carrier SARATOGA, who with other carriers, sent off her planes to attack Tulagi and Guadalcanal preparatory to the landing. Their efforts were coordinated by shore bombardment of a cruiser force who lent a covering fire as the twenty thousand Marines stormed the beaches of Tulagi and Guadalcanal. Numerous enemy aircraft were reported throughout the day by radar and scouting planes of the task force and the warships guarding the Amphibious Forces beat off attacks of enemy bombers and torpedo planes the afternoons of 7 and 8 August 1942.

WORDEN continued operations with SARATOGA for the next two weeks to the south of the Solomons for the protection of supply and communication lines, and to destroy any enemy forces encountered. During the Battle of the Eastern Solomons, 24 August, she guarded carrier SARATOGA who launched air strikes to sink the Japanese carrier RYUJO and damage the Japanese seaplane tender CHITOSE. On 31 August 1942 SARATOGA was damaged by the torpedo hit of an enemy submarine and was escorted by WORDEN and other fleet units to Pearl Harbor where she arrived 23 September 1942. Five days later WORDEN sailed with two other destroyers in the screen of battleships IDAHO and PENNSYLVANIA enroute to the west coast of the United States. She reached San Francisco on 4 October and after battle practice with IDAHO, underwent overhaul in the Mare Island Navy Yard.

On 27 December 1942,

WORDEN departed San Francisco to support the occupation of Amchitka. She reached Dutch Harbor, Alaska, on 1 January 1943 and on 12 January guarded the transport ARTHUR MIDDLETON that landed the preliminary Army security unit on the shores of Constantine Harbor, Amchitka Island. WORDEN had maneuvered into the rock-edged harbor to see the last man ashore from the transport, then turned to the ticklish job of getting out the same way she came in. When almost out of the bay, she hit a pinnacle rock hard under the engine room which immediately flooded and caused a loss of all power. Once she tore free only to become enclosed in a nest of rocks where she was helpless to escape without means of power. Destroyer DEWEY passed a tow line, but the cable parted in the growing storm. Whale boats from that destroyer and landing boats from the transport rescued WORDEN'S survivors under the most hazardous condi-

tions. Commander William Pogue was hauled unconscious out of the sea, having been washed overboard by a huge wave as he directed rescue operations. Fourteen men perished in the sea and WORDEN became a total loss. She beached and broke in two while the fury of the storm spent itself by grounding the ARTHUR MIDDLETON, swamping landing craft and disabling small boats.

WORDEN received four battle stars for her World War II service.

US Army Units In Hawaii

Financial Statements

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors, The Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Inc.

I have audited the accompanying statement of assets, liabilities, and fund balance-cash basis of The Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Inc. as of September 30, 1993, and the related statement of revenue, expenses, and changes in fund balance-cash basis for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Association's management. My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit.

Except as set forth in the following paragraphs, I conducted my audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that I plan and

perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. I believe that my audit provides a reasonable basis for my opinion.

I was not present to observe the taking of the physical inventory at September 30, 1993 (stated at \$32,221), and the Association's records do not permit adequate retroactive tests of those inventory quantities.

As described in Note 1, the Association's policy is to maintain its records on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenue and related assets are recorded when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recorded when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. This basis is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles.

In my opinion, except for the effect of such adjustments, if any, as might have been determined to be necessary had I observed the taking of the physical inventory, the financial statements referred to in the first paragraph present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities, and fund balance of The Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Inc. as of September 30, 1993, and its revenue, expenses, and changes in fund balance for the year then ended, on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

My audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. Schedules A through H are presented for the purpose of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements, and accordingly, I express no opinion on them.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 1993

NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The association is a nonprofit tax-exempt entity as defined under Section 501 (c)(19) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Association is federally chartered and is operated exclusively for purposes beneficial to the interest of the nation and its uniformed services personnel, their dependents and survivors. Each year the Association files a return (Form 990) with the Internal Revenue Service. In addition the Association updates the IRS on the subordinate organizations that are covered by the Association's group exemption letter. State and local chapters with gross receipts in excess of \$25,000 are required to file their own Form 990 with the IRS.

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared principally on a modified cash basis, with the following exceptions: (a) Deferred Life Membership Dues are recorded as they accrue over a ten year period; (b) Prepaid Convention Expenses are deferred until the year of the convention and the fees received for the convention are shown as convention deposits until the year of the convention; and (c) Prepaid insurance is recorded and expensed over the life of the policy and prepaid memorial supplies are recorded and expensed as distributed.

Inventory is priced at lower of cost or market value, on the first-in-first-out method.

Depreciation is provided in amounts sufficient to relate the cost of depreciable assets to operations over their estimated service lives, on the straightline basis.

Several years ago donated assets were reflected as contributions at their estimated value at date of receipt. In recent years no amounts have been recorded for these items (or for donated services) as no objective basis is

available to measure the value of such contributions.

NOTE 2 - DEFERRED LIFE MEMBERSHIP DUES

Current Deferred and Long-Term Deferred Life Membership Dues are carried as liabilities. Life Membership Dues are presently amortized over 10 years whereas Annual Membership Dues are recognized in the year received.

NOTE 3 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Association pays rent to certain of its officers for the use of space in performing their duties.

In addition the Association paid the Treasurer's daughter \$9,029 for secretarial work and the Treasurer's son \$9,953 for data processing work.

NOTE 4 - Investments, which consist of U.S. Treasury Notes and North America Government Income Trust, are stated at cost. The market value of these notes at September 30, 1993 was \$100,547.

NOTE 5 - BACKUP WITHHOLDING

The investment company which handles the investments of the Association had an incorrect Federal Identification Number for the Association. Under Internal Revenue Service regulations the investment company withheld \$1,479 of the Association's investment earnings and remitted this

amount to the Internal Revenue Service. The \$1,479 is reflected on these financial statements under the other assets category. This amount will be refunded to the Association upon its filing of the proper forms with the Internal Revenue Service.

NOTE 6 - LOSS ON REDEMPTION - TREASURY NOTE

In October of 1991 the Association purchased four U.S. Treasury Notes at premiums ranging from \$209 to \$1,521. As the Association uses the cash basis of accounting there was no requirement to amortize the premium. Accordingly the Association has reported the full amount of interest received as income without a reduction for amortization of premium. In September of 1993 a Note with a cost of \$20,209 and a face value of \$20,000 matured. The \$209 difference between the cost and the face value of the Note has been shown as a loss on redemption.

NOTE 7 - PRIOR PERIOD ADJUSTMENT

These financial statements reflect a prior period adjustment which increased the Fund Balance by \$1,990. This adjustment resulted from the Association recording a liability for state and district dues on annual and lifetime dues received from members residing in foreign countries and occurred over several years.

NOTE 8 - CONTINGENT LIABILITY - LITIGATION

A lawsuit has been filed against the Association by a caterer used during the Little Rock convention. The Association's insurance company agreed to a settlement of \$3,000 of which the Association is to pay \$2,500, the amount of its deductible under the policy. Management feels the claim against the Association is without merit and has not yet paid the \$2,500. No provision for any liability relating to the above action has been made in the accompanying financial statements.
