

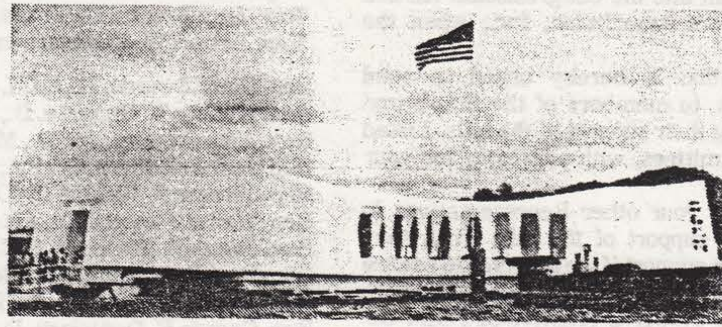

## PHSA IN THE CONGRESSIONAL RECORD

The below entry was made in the Congressional Record, United States of America, Proceedings and debates of 93rd Congress, First Session, Washington, Monday, May 7, 1973, Volume 119, No. 68:

"By Mr. INOUE (for himself, Mr. Abourezk, Mr. Allen, Mr. Cranston, Mr. Dominick, Mr. Ervin, Mrs. Fannin, Mr. Hollings, Mr. Hughes Mr. Pastore, Mr. Ribicoff, Mr. Stevens, Mr. Thurmond, and Mr. Young):

S.1727. A bill to incorporate the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association. Referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

Mr. INOUE, Mr. President, today I have introduced a bill to incorporate the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association. This measure would bestow Federal recognition on this private nonprofit association but would not affect its legal, corporate, or other status.

The association is comprised of men and women who defended our Nation against the historic Japanese attack on the U.S. Pacific Fleet and bases around Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. Since 1941, survivors of the Pearl Harbor attack have formed many local and regional groups, and there are now 101 active chapters located in almost every State. Their national organization, the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, was incorporated in Missouri in 1958.

The National Executive Board of PHSA held a meeting in Kansas City, Missouri, on May 5th and 6th. The three national officers and eight district directors were present. Mr. Wilson M. Rutherford, counselor, attended the meeting.

The following items were discussed and acted upon by the Board:

**LIFE MEMBERSHIP:** Effective December 31, 1973, life membership will be increased to \$75.00.

**OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY - TREASURER:** A recommendation was approved to separate the office into two separate offices, e.g., Secretarial and Treasurer's Office. A resolution is to be submitted at the National Convention in Anaheim in 1974.

**DUES REBATES:** A recommendation was approved to discontinue the quarterly dues rebates to chapters effective December 31, 1974. A resolution is to be submitted at the National Convention in Anaheim in 1974.

## IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

April 5, 1973

Mr. Hebert introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary

### A BILL

To grant a Federal charter to the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Incorporated.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That Merle E. Stouffer, Long Branch, New Jersey; Joel E. Bachner, Floral Park, New York; John C. Berlier, Indianapolis, Indiana; Harley E. Effler, Orange, California; Fred R. McEnany, Portland, Oregon; Steve J. Pechac, Phoenix, Arizona; Richard E. Helmer, Junior, Houston Texas; Thomas E. Decker, Waukegan, Illinois; Forest B. Wooten, Clarksville, Tennessee; John J. Kuzma, Binghamton, New York; Wilson M. Rutherford, El Campa, Texas; Ray Glover, Alderwood Manor, Washington; Allen W. Wilson, Lincoln, Nebraska; George E. Slavens, Walnut Creek, California; Lawrence F. Meier, Saint Louis, Missouri; Henry Shane, Saint Petersburg, Florida; Reverend Marcus A. Valenta, Flatonia, Texas; Michael Dorr, Saint Paul, Minnesota; and their successors, are created a body corporate by the name of "Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Incorporated (hereinafter in this Act referred to as the "corporation")", and by such name shall be know and have perpetual succession and the powers and limitations contained in this Act.


### My Fellow Survivors:

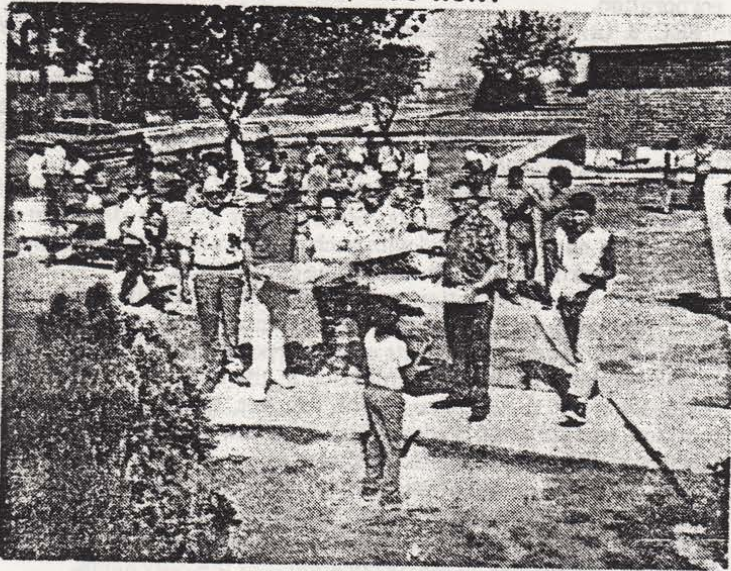

the District Directors during their full term of office e.g., December 8 through December 7 of the following year; or for the full term of office for which elected.

**PLAQUE:** A motion was made and approved to present the District Directors with an appropriate plaque when leaving office in recognition of their services.

**PEARL HARBOR-GRAM:** A motion was made and approved to discontinue bulk mailing of the Pearl Harbor-GRAM to non-members.

**MEMORIAL MARKER:** A motion was made and approved that future memorial markers are to be acquired by the Secretary-Treasurer from the original mold instead of the present plaque with the raised eagle in black.

**MEMBERSHIP CARDS:** A motion was made and approved that all membership cards will bear the signature of the National President and the Secretary-Treasurer. Any change in design or format of the present membership card must be approved by the National Executive Board.

**FLAG:** A motion was made and approved for Mr. Hap Searles to purchase a flag, not to exceed \$350.00 and payable by the National Office, to replace the flag that disappeared at one of the National Conventions.

**ARIZONIA MEMORIAL:** A

motion was made and approved to use the photograph of the USS Arizona Memorial on the front cover of the Pearl Harbor-GRAM.

**ASSOCIATION SEAL:** A motion was made and approved that all requests for use of the association seal be submitted in writing to the National Executive Board for approval. Further, no chapter is to be granted sole or exclusive rights to the use of the seal on any item that would prevent another chapter from having a like item made at a reduced price and better material.

**HAWAIIAN SURPLUS MONIES:** A motion was made and approved to purchase time certificates at a higher rate of interest, using the Hawaiian surplus money amounting to approximately \$27,098.06.

**THE "ACCUSED" AND "ONE SUNDAY MORNING":** A motion was made and approved for the National Secretary-Treasurer to maintain a supply of twenty five (25) each of the book "Accused" and "One Sunday Morning" for sale to the membership and others wishing to purchase the books.

**BUDGET AND FINANCE COMMITTEE:** The following members were appointed to serve on the committee as indicated: John C. Berlier, Chairman; James Gross, member; and Jesse E. Pond, Jr., member.

### LAST PEARL HARBOR VETERAN PLACED OUT OF SERVICE

The Yard Tug NOKOMIS (YT-142) was placed out of service and stricken from the Navy Register on 1 May 1973. This action removed from active duty the last Navy vessel that was present at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. She was preceded into retirement by the OSCEOLA (YT-129), another Pearl Harbor veteran, on February 15, 1973.

The NOKOMIS was built at the Navy Yard, Bremerton, WA., placed in service in March of 1940

and allocated to the 14th Naval District for duty.

The OSCEOLA was launched by the Navy Yard, Charleston, SC, March 3, 1939 and reported to 14th Naval District for duty in September of that year.

Three other Service Craft, although not on active duty with the Navy, remain on the Navy Register; the HOGA (YT-145) has been on loan to Port of Oakland since June 1948, and is serving there as a harbor tug; YNg-17 has been out of service at Pearl Harbor since July 1969; and YO-43 has been out of service at Bremerton since 1946.

An estimated 12,500 surviving members of the U.S. Armed Forces served at Pearl Harbor and in the area of Oahu Island during the December 7 attack. Of that number, the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association has an active membership of 5,259 men and women. Anyone who was a member of the Armed Forces on Oahu or who was stationed aboard a ship located within 3 miles of the island on December 7, 1941, is eligible to join. Members must either have been honorably discharged or still be a member of our Armed Forces. The association conducts regular chapter, district, and State meetings, and a biennial national convention.

The motto of the organization is "Keep America Alert," which the association seeks to accomplish by preserving historical mementos and chronicles of the Pearl Harbor attack; protecting graves of Pearl Harbor victims; and stimulating Americans to take a more active interest in the affairs and future of the United States. The association has been particularly active in veterans' causes and national preparedness.

The association is unique because it will exist only as long as there are Pearl Harbor survivors. In order for the association to be more effective, it is imperative that it be recognized through the granting of a Federal charter. I believe the association fulfills all of the necessary requirements.

I am proud to sponsor this legislation as are the cosponsors who joined me in this effort. I ask unanimous consent to have printed in the CONGRESSIONAL RECORD a statement by the

Pearl Harbor Survivors Association. I believe it best summarizes the purpose of the organization.

There being no objection, the statement was ordered to be printed in the RECORD, as follows:

### REMEMBER PEARL HARBOR

On that peaceful Sunday morning, December 7th, 1941, an enemy attack force hit Pearl Harbor with all its fury of death and destruction. In only 30 short minutes the attackers accomplished their most important mission, they had wrecked the battle force of the United States Pacific Fleet. We also lost half of the military aircraft on the island. We accounted for ourselves as military, by fighting back, not yet aware that history had been thrust upon us. Pearl Harbor was the actual beginning of the great war which was to change the entire political structure of the world. We Americans who were there, demonstrated that we were prepared to give our lives, and did give them when necessary. Our sacrifice at Pearl Harbor united the nation and gave rise to a determination to protect and keep the American freedom. Our sacrifice alerted a relaxed nation, brought it to its feet and caused it to win World War II. The lesson we learned by our sacrifice will not be easily forgotten. Many of us are no longer of use as sailors, soldiers, marines and airmen. We must make ourselves useful at home, by dedicating ourselves to the principals of freedom; by doing everything within our power to bring about a commitment of patriotism. We survivors who are still alive, and to those that did not survive, we can never permit ourselves to become vulnerable again."

known and have perpetual succession and the powers and limitations contained in this Act.

SEC. 2. A majority of the persons named in the first section of this Act, acting in person or by written proxy, are authorized to complete the organization of the corporation by the selection of officers and employees, the adoption of a constitution and bylaws, not inconsistent with this Act, and the doing of such other acts as may be necessary to complete the organization of the corporation.

SEC. 3. The objects and purposes of the corporation shall be—

(1) to uphold and defend the Constitution of the United States;

(2) to collate, preserve, and encourage the study of historical evidence, chronicles, mementos, and accounts pertaining to "The Day of Infamy, 7 December 1941", and in particular those memories and records of patriotic service performed by the Pearl Harbor survivors and to shield from neglect the graves of all the heroic Pearl Harbor survivors;

(3) to stimulate communities and political subdivisions into taking more interest in the affairs and future of the United States of America, so as to prevent another "Pearl Harbor" from blemishing the history of our beloved country;

(4) to fight unceasingly for our national security in order to protect Americans from enemies within our borders, as well as those from without; to end that our American way of life will be preserved, and to foster the spirit and practice of Americanism; and

(5) to instill love of country and flag and to promote soundness of mind and body in the youth of our country.

SEC. 4. Subject to all applicable laws of the United States, and of any State in which the corporation operates, the corporation shall have power—

(1) to sue and be sued, complain, and defend in any court of competent jurisdiction;

(2) to adopt, alter, and use a corporate seal for the sole and exclusive use of the corporation;

(3) to acquire, control, hold, lease, and dispose of such real, personal, or mixed property as may be necessary to carry out the corporate purposes;

(4) to contract and be contracted with;

(5) to adopt, amend, and alter a constitution and bylaws, not inconsistent with this charter, for the management of its property and the regulation of its affairs;

(6) to charge and collect membership dues, subscription fees, and receive contributions or grants of money or property to be devoted to the carrying out of its purposes;

(7) to establish, regulate, and maintain offices for the conduct of the affairs of the corporation;

(8) to promote the formation of subordinate ladies auxiliaries, the membership requirements of which shall be determined according to the constitution and the bylaws of the corporation;

(9) to publish a magazine or other publications;

(10) to adopt emblems and badges; and

(11) to do any and all lawful acts necessary or desirable in carrying

SEC. 5. The corporation shall have no power to issue capital stock or engage in business for pecuniary profit or gain.

SEC. 6. The corporation shall be nonpolitical and, as an organization, shall not furnish financial aid to, or otherwise promote the candidacy of, any person seeking public office.

SEC. 7. Eligibility for membership in the corporation and the rights, privileges, and designation of classes of members shall be determined as the constitution and bylaws of the corporation may provide, but in no case shall eligibility for membership include persons who did not serve honorably in the Armed Forces of the United States of America.

SEC. 8. (a) The principal office of the corporation shall be located in Indianapolis, Indiana, or in such other place as may be determined by the corporation, but the activities of the corporation shall not be confined to that place, but may be conducted throughout the various States, District of Columbia, and territories and possessions of the United States.

(b) The corporation shall have in the District of Columbia at all times a designated agent authorized to accept services of process for the corporation. Service upon, or notice mailed to the business ad-

dress of, such agent shall be deemed notice to or service upon the corporation.

SEC. 9. (a) The corporation shall have a national executive board as may be provided for in the by-laws of the corporation.

(b) Qualifications of executive board members, the manner of selection of such members, terms of office of such members, and the powers and responsibilities of the board shall be set forth in the by-laws of the corporation.

SEC. 10. The officers of the corporation shall be those provided for in the by-laws of the corporation. Such officers shall be elected in such manner, for such terms, and with such powers and responsibilities, as may be prescribed in the by-laws of the corporation.

SEC. 11. Upon dissolution or final liquidation of the corporation, after discharge or satisfaction of all outstanding obligations and liabilities, the remaining assets of the corporation may be distributed in accordance with the determination of the executive board of the corporation and in compliance with this Act, the by-laws of the corporation, and all other Federal and State laws, and the laws of the District of Columbia applicable thereto.

SEC. 12. The corporation and its regional districts and local branches shall have the sole and exclusive right to use the name "Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Incorporated" and such seals, emblems, and badges as the corporation may lawfully adopt.

SEC. 13. (a) No part of the assets or income of the corporation shall inure to any member or officer of the corporation, or be distributable to any such person during the life of the corporation or upon its dissolution or final liquidation. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to prevent the payment of compensation to officers of the corporation or reimbursement for actual necessary expenses in amounts approved by the executive board of the corporation.

(b) The corporation shall not make loans to its members, officers, or employees. Any member of the executive board who votes for or assents to the making of a loan or advance to a member, officer, or employee of the corporation, and any officer who participates in the making of such a loan or advance, shall be jointly and severally liable to the corporation for the amount of such loan until the repayment thereof.

SEC. 14. The corporation shall be liable for the acts of its officers and agents when acting within the scope of their authority.

SEC. 15. The corporation shall keep correct and complete books and records of account and shall keep minutes of proceedings of its members, national convention, executive board, and authorized committees, and it shall also keep at its principal office a record of the names and addresses of its members entitled to vote. All books and records of the corporation may be inspected by any member, or his agent or attorney, for any proper purpose, at any reasonable time.

SEC. 16. The provisions of sections 2 and 3 of the Act of August 30, 1964 (36 U.S.C. 1102, 1103), entitled "An Act to provide for audit of accounts of private corporations established under Federal law" shall apply with respect to the corporation.

SEC. 17. The right to alter, amend, or repeal this Act is hereby expressly reserved.

**A BILL**

To authorize the Secretary of the Navy to construct and provide shoreside facilities for the education and convenience of visitors to the United States Ship Arizona Memorial at Pearl Harbor and to transfer responsibility for their operation and maintenance to the National Park Service.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Navy is authorized to provide for the construction, establishment, and maintenance of permanent shoreside facilities (including, but not limited to, a theater and museum) within the Pearl Harbor Naval Base, Hawaii, to provide for the education and convenience of visitors to the United States Ship Arizona Memorial.

SEC. 2. The Secretary of the Navy, after consultation called for in section 3 hereof, may include and display in the theater and museum such personal property, relics, documents, memorabilia, films, and exhibits as he deems appropriate to assist visitors to enhance their understanding of the history and American interest in the Pacific Ocean areas, and to deepen their appreciation of the great heroism and patriotism of the men who lost their lives at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, and in the Pacific Ocean areas during World War II.

SEC. 3. In carrying out his duties under this Act, including (but not limited to) the planning, construction, equipping, and furnishing of the shoreside facilities, the Secretary of the Navy is authorized to consult with, seek the advice and assistance of, and receive and accept gifts from, any interested individuals, agencies, groups, or

Gentlemen:

I have examined the attached Statement of Financial Condition as of December 31, 1972 and the Statement of Cash Receipts and Disbursements of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Inc. for the twelve months ended December 31, 1972. My examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and included such auditing procedures which I considered necessary in the circumstances. I examined and reported upon the financial statements of the Association for the previous year.

Surplus and Reserve for Life Membership increased from \$69,530.71 to \$119,554.58 during 1972, however, \$32,257.52 of this increase resulted from a receipt from Fitzpatrick Travel Service for the surplus from the Hawaiian 1971 Convention. Total membership increased from 4797 to 5259, which is an increase of 9.6 per cent. Life membership (included in the above amounts) increased from 1664 to 1907 which is a 14.6 per cent increase. Eligible known survivors who are not presently members numbered 7437 at the end of 1972.

In my opinion, the aforesaid financial statements present fairly the financial position of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Inc. at December 31, 1972 and the results of its operations for the year ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

**HELLO: REMEMBER ME?**

Some people call me Old Glory, others call me the Star Spangled Banner, but whatever they call me, I am YOUR flag, the Flag of the United States of America. . . something has been bothering me, so I thought I might talk it over with you. . . because it is about you and me. . .

I remember when people would line up on both sides of the street to watch a parade, and naturally, I was leading it, proudly waving in the breeze. When your daddy saw me coming, he immediately removed his hat and placed it against his left shoulder, so that the hat was directly over his heart. . . remember?

And you, I remember you. Standing there straight as a soldier, you didn't have a hat, but you were giving the right salute. . . and remember little sister? Not to be outdone, she was saluting the same as you with her right hand over her heart. . . remember?

What happened? I'm still the same old flag. Oh, I have a few more stars since you were a boy. A lot more blood has been shed since those parades of long ago.

**YOU REMEMBERED!**

The instrument that Richard G. Smith is holding is one of his own creations, which is already implemented and saving money for the University of Utah.

"Smitty" is employed in the heating department of the University. He describes the use of the instrument he is holding as simple, "Two (2) 1/4 20 machine screws hold it tight to the top of an air compressor piston. By twisting or turning the "T" handle you can unwind the lower nut on the connecting rod shaft. The "T" handle then lifts out but leaves the plate on top of the piston which has a big screw eye in it. Then the heavy piston can be hoisted out by a "come-along" or chain hoist."

The morning of December 7th, 1941, found "Smitty", fireman first class assigned to the ship's officers' motor boat, returning from the Officers' Club Landing with Chaplain MaGuire who was to hold fleet religious services aboard the USS California, when the enemy's torpedo planes came in low and attacked our fleet, ships and installations at Pearl Harbor.

## GROUNDBREAKING CEREMONY HOSPITAL CORPS SCHOOL, GREAT LAKES, ILLINOIS

The new Hospital Corps School will be a two story circular structure with a two rectangular wing extending from the main building. Construction will be on reinforced concrete applied to a structural steel frame, steel joists and a steel deck. The building envelope will consist of brick faced cavity walls, textured concrete, and aluminum windows and entrance doors. Design features include central air-conditioning and provisions for closed circuit television in the classrooms. Designed to accommodate 1,120 students, the school building will contain 68,500 square feet of floor area in 16 classrooms, two medical wards, a multi-purpose area, administration support training areas, a library, instructor and student lounges, and a TV studio.

The project also includes a construction of a 212 car parking area, site utilities, and site improvements.

The construction contract for the school was awarded to Arch Associates, Inc. of Chicago, Ill., on October 27, 1972 for \$2,275,000. The contract completion date is May 6, 1974.

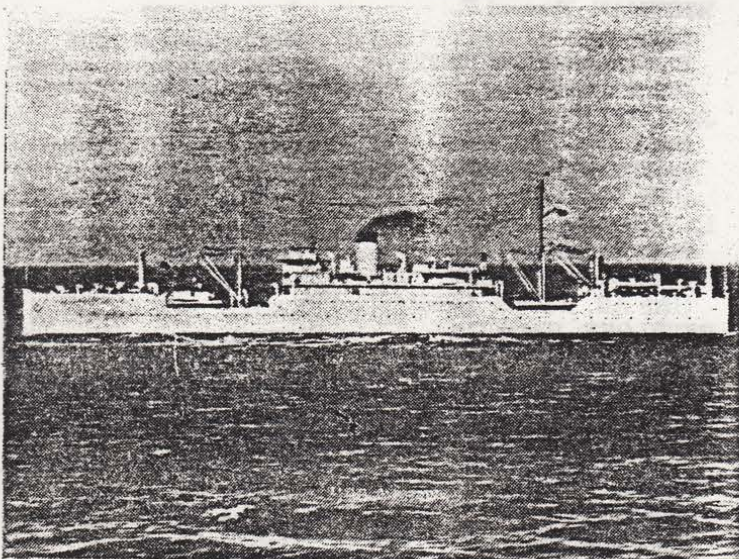

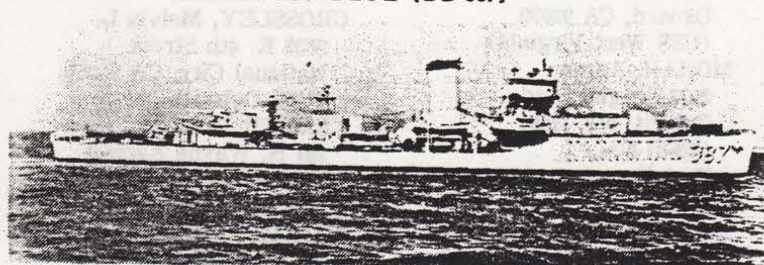

## USS BLUE (DD-387)



Caught in a rain of bombs with only four junior officers - all Ensigns - and a handful of enlisted men aboard, the USS BLUE (DD-387) accepted the Jap's challenge in the attack on Pearl Harbor, Dec. 7, 1941, by shooting down four enemy planes and sinking a Japanese submarine. Eight months after Pearl Harbor, the BLUE was hit by a torpedo fired from a Jap torpedo boat and was later scuttled by her own crew after being towed to Tulagi, in the Solomons. 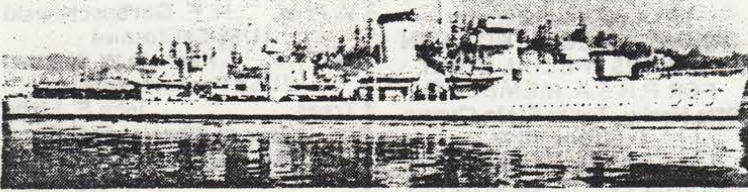

**USS JARVIS (DD-393)**



The second USS JARVIS (DD-393) was built by the Puget Sound Navy Yard, Bremerton, Washington. She was launched 6 May 1937 and commissioned on 27 October 1937.

JARVIS had an overall length of 341 feet, 4 inches; extreme beam, 35 feet, 6 inches; normal displacement of 1,500 tons; mean draft, 9 feet, 10 inches; a designed speed of 35 knots; and a designed complement of 8 officers and 150 enlisted men. Her original armament was four 5-inch 38-caliber guns, four 50-caliber machine guns, and sixteen 21-inch torpedo tubes.

When the Japanese struck Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, JARVIS was moored port side to USS MUGFORD in Berth Six. One seaman was wounded by flying shrapnel but he remained at his station passing ammunition to the guns aft.

The JARVIS disappeared with all hands on 9 August 1942 after heavy torpedo damage. All information indicates she was sunk south of the Solomon Islands by heavy air attacks while trying to reach a repair base.

In her final minutes of annihilation, the USS JARVIS served a noble purpose not realized until after the end of WWII. Had not the Japanese planes found the destroyer, they no doubt would have kept on their course and caught the transports, still unloading Marines at Guadalcanal, with little anti-aircraft and no fighter plane protection. There was also the possibility that they might have found the

"The USS JARVIS (DD-393) died the death of a true martyr."
