

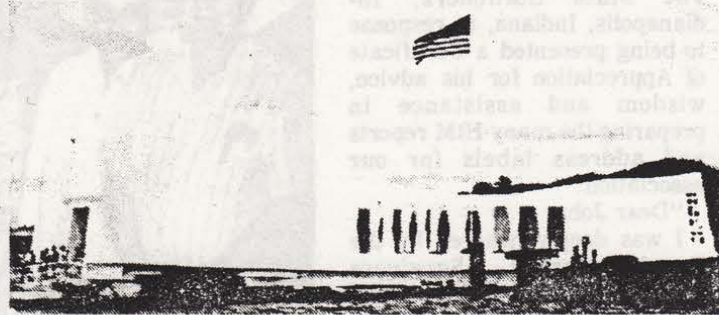

PHSA NATIONAL OFFICERS MEET WITH FITZPATRICK TRAVEL AGENCY

The four PHSANational officers, Joel E. Bachner, president; George E. Slavens, vice president; Fred R. McEnany, secretary; and Jesse E. Pond, Jr., treasurer, had a meeting in Fresno, California, July 25, 1975, with three representatives from the FitzPatrick Travel Agency, Jo Elliott, Olive Davis, and Florence Drayton, to discuss and formulate plans for PHSAs 1976 Honolulu Convention and memorial services. Fred Garbuschewski, Hawaii state chairman, attended the meeting.

A "basic one-week" package from the West Coast works out to be \$393.85 per person, based on double occupancy, and includes seven (7) nights at the Sheraton-Waikiki "standard", reception, land transportation and a function package.

This "basic one-week" package from the West Coast includes:

- (a) air transportation, plus tax, plus security charges.....\$240.75
- (b) 7 nights Sheraton Waikiki "standard", including tax .105.60
- (c) reception.....5.00
- (d) tips to bell boys.....1.50
- (e) land transportation includes: lei greeting, round trip transfer to Pearl Harbor for Navy trip to Arizona Memorial, round trip transfer to Punchbowl, round trip transfer between airport and hotel, and one additional transfer for sunset services.....20.00
- (f) brunch.....6.00
- (g) banquet.....15.00

There are two basic programs being offered, December 3-10 or December 4-11, with extensions in Waikiki or neighbor island tours.

For Saturday departures, there will be an additional \$15.00 charge.

Your complete tour package includes Hawaii hotel and taxes, airline fare and taxes, and airport security charges. All tour package prices are "per person" and based on double occupancy.

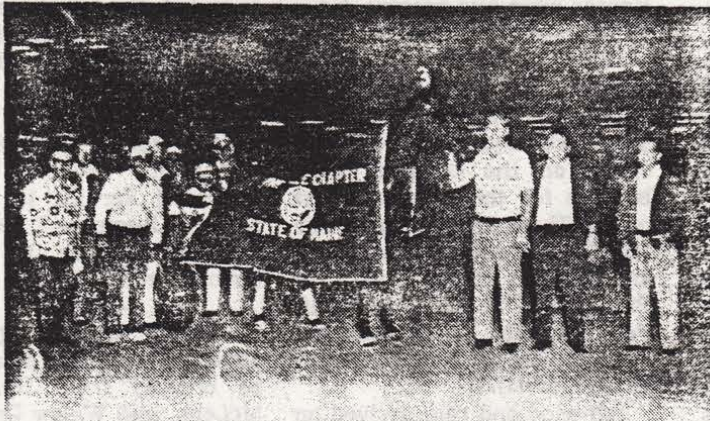

PREAMBLE

We, officers and enlisted personnel, all survivors of the infamous attack on December 7, 1941 at Pearl Harbor, band ourselves together for the purpose of promoting and promulgating the obligations of citizenship and patriotism; and to aid in protecting our Nation, as laymen, from all her enemies whether from within or without.

ARTICLE I

Name

This organization, hereinafter referred to as "association" or "the association" shall be known as the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Incorporated, and may be identified by the initials, "PHSA".

ARTICLE II

National Administrative Office

The National Administrative Office of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Inc., is to be located at the office of the duly elected Secretary, within 90 days after said election. The location of the National Administrative Office may be changed by a three quarter (¾) majority vote of the National Executive Board.

ARTICLE III

Objects

The objects of the association shall be:

1. Keep alive the memory of our brethren who perished in the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941.
2. For fraternal, patriotic, historical and educational purposes.
3. To preserve and strengthen comradeship among its members.
4. To maintain true allegiance to the government of the United States.
5. Foster true patriotism.
6. Maintain and extend the institution of American freedom.

7. Preserve and defend the United States from her enemies.

ARTICLE IV

National Organization Structure

The structure of the Association shall consist of the following, all hereinafter described:

1. Elected national officers of the association.
2. National Executive Board.
3. State Officers.
4. Chapters.
5. Members.

ARTICLE V

Elected National Officers and Their Duties

1. The National President shall:
 - a. Preside over the national convention.
 - b. Appoint chairmen of all national committees and instruct them as to their duties.
 - c. Be the official spokesman for the national association; be the presiding officer of the National Executive Board.
 - d. Appoint qualified and eligible members to fill vacancies in any elective national offices for unexpired terms of the vacant offices.
 - e. Call special meetings of the Executive Board when deemed necessary.
 - f. Cast his vote in any matter before the Executive Board in the event of a tie.
2. The National Vice-President shall:
 - a. Assist the President.
 - b. Preside for the President in the event of his absence.
 - c. Succeed to the Presidency in the event of its vacancy, prior to the regular election.
3. The National District Directors shall:
 - a. Be the Chief Executive Officer for his district and shall direct all activities of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association therein.

(The United States of America shall be geographically divided into eight (8) districts. DISTRICT 1 shall consist of: Alaska, California, Hawaii, and Nevada. DISTRICT 2 shall consist of: Idaho, Montana, Oregon, Wyoming, and Washington. DISTRICT 3 shall consist of: Arizona, Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Utah. DISTRICT 4 shall consist of: Arkansas, Louisiana, Missouri and Texas. DISTRICT 5 shall consist of: Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, North Dakota, South Dakota and Wisconsin. DISTRICT 6 shall consist of:

National Constitution and By-Laws

Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee. DISTRICT 7 shall consist of: Delaware, Maryland, Michigan, New Jersey, Ohio, Virginia, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and District of Columbia. DISTRICT 8 shall consist of: Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New York, Rhode Island and Vermont.)

4. The Secretary shall:
 - a. Be custodian of the corporate seal.
 - b. Prepare and preserve minutes of all national meetings.
 - c. Maintain and preserve Master Membership list and furnish all National Executive Board Members with copies of these lists bi-annually.
 - d. Notify all members of National Meetings, Conventions or Reunions, in the Official Publication of PHSA, Inc.
 - e. Maintain current lists of all National, State and Chapter Officers, and furnish all National Executive Board Members these lists annually or as changes occur.
 - f. Prepare such reports as required by the National Executive Board.
 - g. Direct the necessary activities of the National Administrative Office, as outlined by the National Executive Board.
5. The Treasurer shall:
 - a. Be the fiscal officer of the National Association.
 - b. Be custodian of all properties, funds, securities and assets of the Association.
 - c. Pay all reasonable and necessary bills of the Association, authorized by the National Executive Board.
 - d. Maintain a complete and accurate record of all receipts and disbursements.
 - e. Furnish the National Association with a surety bond to cover all monies, bonds, and securities handled, premium to be paid by the Association, (amount of which to be determined by the National Executive Board).
 - f. Prepare annually, for distribution, to every member in good standing, a statement of operations and conditions of the Association, in the Official Publication of PHSA, Inc.
 - g. Prepare such reports as required by the National Executive Board.
 - h. Recommend rules and regulations for the handling of funds, including remittances to his office from any subordinate body. Such rules and

regulations shall be approved by the National Executive Board.

- i. Perform all such other duties as required by the Constitution and By-Laws, and those duties as directed by the National Executive Board.
- j. Cause the Association financial record to be audited annually by a licensed, Certified Public Accountant at the close of each calendar year. Upon completion of the Accountants report, it shall be submitted directly to the National Executive Board.

ARTICLE VI

National Executive Board and Duties

1. The National Executive Board, hereinafter referred to as the "Executive Board", shall consist of the following national officers:
 - a. The President of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, who also shall be chairman of the Executive Board.
 - b. The Vice-President of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association.
 - c. The Secretary of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Inc.
 - d. The Treasurer of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Inc.
 - e. The (8) Eight District Directors of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Inc.
2. The Chairman of the Executive Board shall:
 - a. Conduct all meetings of the Executive Board in accordance with the "Roberts Rules of Order".
 - b. Bring before the Executive Board all matters requiring their action.
 - c. Call regular or special meetings of the Executive Board. The board shall meet or vote at least semi-annually. The board shall be permitted to vote on all issues using United States mail.
3. The Secretary shall act as Secretary of the Executive Board and shall:
 - a. Prepare and preserve minutes of all meetings of the board.
 - b. Notify all concerned of board meetings.
 - c. Handle all correspondence of the board.
4. The Executive Board shall be presented with and decide upon the following:
 - a. Issues involving the spending of all monies.
 - b. Interpretation of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association.
 - c. All grievances from members, State Chairmen, State Chapters or District Directors.
 - d. The suspension or revocation of charters, a two-thirds vote of the board required for such suspension or revocation.
 - e. The suspension or revocation of membership in the association is a two-thirds vote of the board required to effect such suspension or revocation.
 - f. The employment of clerical, technical and professional assistants, and the payment therefor.
 - g. The calling of special conventions. A two-thirds approval required by the Executive Board.
 - h. The absorption, amalgamation, merger or affiliation with any other organization.
 - i. All marks, insignia, uniforms and other

designating paraphernalia of the association, including the power to retake, repossess and change of design.

- j. The Confirmation of state chairmen.
 - k. Bonafide and approved expenses of the various Officers of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Inc.
5. The Executive Board shall have all powers conferred elsewhere in this constitution, including jurisdiction without limitation, of all members, chapters, state chairmen and all other subordinate bodies or groups which are now in existence or may later come into existence.

ARTICLE VII

Membership

1. Application form:
 - a. There shall be an application for membership form.
2. Annual Dues, Life Membership and Initiation Fee:
 - a. Annual dues shall be determined at each National Convention by vote. Two-thirds (2/3) affirmative vote of members sitting required.
 - b. Life Membership cost shall be determined at each National Convention by vote. Two-thirds (2/3) affirmative vote of members sitting required.
 - c. Initiation fee shall be determined at each National Convention by vote. Two-thirds (2/3) affirmative vote of members sitting required with members sitting to vote on each fee or cost item separately.
3. Rules for applying for membership:
 - a. Complete the required application form and submit same, accompanied by the initiation fee and annual dues or life membership.
 - b. The association reserves the right to use whatever means necessary to verify statements made by applicants on application forms.
4. Qualifications for membership:
 - a. Must have been a member of the Armed Forces of the USA, December 7, 1941.
 - b. Must have been on station at the time of the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor or on the Island of Oahu, or offshore, not to exceed three (3) miles during time 0755-0945 as per application blank.
 - c. If a member is discharged from the Armed Forces of the USA, he must have received an honorable discharge or received a discharge under honorable conditions.
 - d. Must not be a member or ever become a member of the communist party, or any subversive organization which advocates the overthrow of the United States Government.
5. Rights and privileges of members in good standing:
 - a. May attend all national conventions and vote on issues at the business meeting.
 - b. May make motions, recommendations and proposals from the floor at the business meeting in accordance with parliamentary rules.
 - c. Members are entitled to all mailing material published by the association.
 - d. Members are entitled to receive a copy of the annual financial report issued by the National Treasurer.

e. Members are entitled to take grievances before the National Executive Board, either in person or in writing.

6. Obligations of members:
 - a. Members must maintain true allegiance to the United States.
 - b. Member must encourage alertness and preparedness of the Armed Forces of the USA.
 - c. Member should keep the memory of Pearl Harbor alive.
 - d. Member should whenever possible, attend the national or local Memorial Service each December Seventh.
 - e. Member shall not wear the PHSA uniform or insignia, except while attending official PHSA meetings or gatherings or other patriotic functions and displays.
 - f. Members shall at all times conduct themselves in a manner so as to be a credit to the PHSA.
 - g. The introduction or discussion of sectarian matters or partisan politics is prohibited in any meeting or convention of the Association, its districts or its chapters; and the name, insignia, emblem or records of the Association, its districts or its chapters shall not be used for any sectarian, business, or partisan political purpose.
 - h. Member, to be in continuous good standing, must pay his renewal dues within (90) ninety days after close of the membership year.

ARTICLE VIII

Elections

1. All nominations for national officers shall be made in open convention and elections shall be by roll call vote. It shall require a plurality of all votes cast, to elect to office, the President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer. It shall require a plurality of all votes cast by the voters of the district, to elect the District Director of the District in which the nominee shall be eligible.
2. A term of office shall be for two (2) years, or the interval between a national convention, and until a successor is qualified.
3. Eligibility to hold national office:
 - a. Be a member in good standing.
 - b. Must presently be, or have been a National Officer, a State Chairman or an elected officer of a Chartered Local Chapter.
 - c. Any candidate which shall have been removed from a qualifying office, for disciplinary reasons, shall not be eligible for nomination.

ARTICLE IX

Subordinate Bodies

In order to facilitate and further the objects of the PHSA, the following subordinate bodies, all hereinafter described, are authorized.

1. State Chairman:
 - a. Election:

All State Chairmen shall be elected by the members of the respective states. Provided however, if there is not a qualified Chapter in the State, then it shall be the duty of the National President on the recommendation of the District Director to appoint a State Chairman who shall serve in such

capacity with all of the obligations and privileges hereinafter enumerated until a State Chairman is duly elected by the members of that State and that in the interim, any State Chairman appointed by the National President shall serve a probationary period of one year with option of the President to extend the appointment.

b. Qualifications:

1. Shall be a member in good standing. Shall accept his appointment in writing to the National Executive Board.
3. Shall demonstrate an earnest desire to further the national association.

c. Obligations:

1. Shall perform his duties without salary.
2. Shall devote sufficient time and effort to locate survivors within his State and encourage their membership in the PHSA.
3. Shall keep complete and accurate records of all receipts and disbursements made on behalf of PHSA.
4. Shall encourage the formation of chartered local chapters.
5. Shall be responsible to the National Executive Board for all of his official acts.
6. Shall abide by the Constitution and By-Laws of the PHSA.
7. Shall upon termination of his appointment or term of elected office, surrender all books, records, membership lists, monies and properties, in his possession as State Chairman of PHSA, Inc., to his duly elected successor, or as directed by the National Headquarters. Any dispute arising between a retiring State Chairman and his successor concerning the surrender of the aforementioned items will be forwarded to the National Executive Board, through the appropriate District Directors, for resolution.
8. Shall follow all orders issued by the National President or the Executive Board.

d. Privileges of the State Chairman:

1. Shall be Chief Executive officer of the PHSA within his own State in the absence of the National President.
2. Shall be entitled to the same distribution of membership dues as those allowed chartered local chapters if same were in existence. Whenever a local chapter is chartered, said chapter shall be entitled to receive its distribution of members dues. If local chapter is chartered at a time other than the beginning of an official year, the State Chairman shall remit to the chapter, its (Prorata) share of dues.

e. The term of the State Chairmen appointments:

1. State Chairman shall be elected for a term of two years, or the interval between a National Convention and until a successor is elected and qualified.

2. National Chartered Local Chapters:

a. Requirements:

1. Prepare applications for charter to the National Executive Board on the prescribed form issued by said board. Application must be signed by at least seven members in good standing of the PHSA. These members must also be qualified to become members of the chapter seeking such charter in ac-

cordance with boundaries of states sectional divisions.

2. Receive written approval of the State Chairman or District Director.
3. Remit charter fee of Twenty-five (\$25.00) Dollars with application.
4. Upon receiving Executive Board approval of application, the local chapter officers shall be elected.
5. Execute contract with National Office. If contract is not executed within (30) Thirty days after election of officers, the application is automatically revoked, by the National Executive Board.

b. Obligations:

1. Abide by the National PHSA Constitution and By-Laws including all alterations and amendments thereto.
2. Shall purchase all stationery, insignia and other paraphernalia from the national office. Supplies bearing the registration mark or insignia of PHSA must receive the written approval of the National Executive Board.
3. Shall forward promptly, to the National Treasurer, all monies received for initiation fees, membership dues, or from any other source, belonging in whole or in part to the national office.
4. Shall conduct business meetings at least semi-annually.
5. Shall elect Chapter President; Vice-President; Secretary; Treasurer; and three (3) Trustees.
6. Shall notify the National Secretary of the names and addresses of all chapter officers.
7. Shall notify the National Secretary of the names and addresses of all survivors located.
8. The Chapter Trustees, shall annually examine the financial records of the local chapter and furnish the National Treasurer with a signed statement of operations and conditions as of December 31st, by February 1st, of the following year.
9. Shall keep complete and accurate records of all receipts and disbursements of their respective chapter.
10. Shall produce all chapter records, regardless of nature to any national officer for examination.
11. Upon dissolution of any local Chapter, regardless of reason, all Chapter monies, securities, property and records, shall be disposed of as directed by the National Executive Board.
12. Shall deposit the chapters monies in recognized banking institutions in the name of the local chapter. At least two (2) chapter officers must be co-makers of every disbursement check made.

c. Privileges:

1. Local chapters may adopt their own By-Laws, however, such By-Laws, must not be in conflict with the National Association Constitution and By-Laws. All such local By-Laws must be presented to and approved by the National Executive Board.

d. Local Chapter Executive Board:

1. A local chapter's Executive Board shall consist of the officers mentioned in Article IX, Subsection 2 (b) 5, above.
2. Local chapter Executive Board shall meet at least semi-annually.

e. Nominations and Elections:

1. Nominations and election of local chapter officers shall be conducted at a general meeting of said chapter. This meeting shall be conducted at least two (2) weeks prior to the national convention.

ARTICLE X

Official Year

1. The "Official Year" of the PHSA Inc., shall be from December 8th to December 7th of the following year.

ARTICLE XI

National Convention and Memorial Service

1. The national convention or reunion shall be held at such time as to include the date December 7. The official time of the PHSA Memorial Service shall be (0755) Seven Fifty-five (7:55) o'clock a.m. Honolulu time December 7th thereby commemorating the exact clock time of the attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7th, 1941. Effective after December, 1966, national convention or reunion shall be held bi-annually on even numbered years only.

ARTICLE XII

Quorum at National Convention

1. Those members present, in good standing, shall constitute a quorum, for the transaction of business for the PHSA, Inc.

ARTICLE XIII

Gender

1. Words in this constitution indicating the masculine gender, shall be deemed also to include the feminine gender.

ARTICLE XIV

Additional Miscellaneous Provisions

1. Supreme Authority:
 - a. The supreme authority and direction of the association are vested in the association's Constitution and By-Laws.
2. Parliamentary Procedure:
 - a. "Roberts Rules of Order" shall govern parliamentary procedure in all meetings, assemblies and conventions of the association.
3. Savings Clause:
 - a. If any provision of this Constitution shall be declared invalid or inoperative by any competent authority or by operation of law, the remainder of this Constitution shall not be affected thereby.
4. Distribution of Membership Dues and Initiation Fees:
 - a. Initiation Fees:
 1. The Initiation Fees shall accrue to the National Office (100 percent).
 - b. Membership Dues:
 1. (75 percent) - to the national association of the PHSA.
 2. (5 percent) - to the national District Director Officer, of the dues received from members within his official district.
 3. (20 percent) - to the local chartered chapter treasurer or to the state chairman of the state in accordance with

Article IX, Subsection 1 d 2.

4. Distribution of said monies shall be made at the end of each calendar quarter and within 30 days from the end thereof.

5. All officers of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, National and State, and all Directors, Trustees, State Chairmen, subordinate bodies, and members in general, who may regularly, or from time to time, receive money from the National Organization, its subsidiaries or affiliates shall prepare and file an annual account of all such money received and the disbursement made therefrom and the balance of such money, if any, on hand. The accounting herein required shall be made and filed with the Secretary and Treasurer of the National Organization on or before thirty days before the end of its fiscal year. The requirements of this section shall be enforced by the National Executive Committee in accordance with the provision of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association, Inc., and/or by any other lawful methods.

ARTICLE XV Amendments

1. This instrument shall be known as the Constitution and By-Laws of the PHSA, Inc., and may be amended at any National Convention by three-fourths affirmative vote of members sitting in at convention.

ARTICLE XVI Adoption

This document was originally adopted at National Convention on December 8, 1962 at Long Beach, California. Thence, revised at National Convention in St. Louis, Missouri on December 6, 1963, revised at National Convention in Clearwater, Florida on December 6, 1965 revised at National Convention in Seattle, Washington on December 6, 1968 and revised at National Convention in New York City, N.Y. on December 6, 1970, revised again in Anaheim, California, on December 6, 1974 and approved. All copies of the Constitution and By-Laws prior to the 1974 revisions are hereby revoked and shall become null and void immediately upon acceptance and approval of this revision.

Following the service which is hosted by Chapter No. 9, Chapter No. 1 is hosting a "brunch" and a Dinner Dance at the Naval Base in Long Beach. Deadline for reservations is November 1st. Price \$7.50 for dinner, Brunch (no firm price but will be under \$3.00). 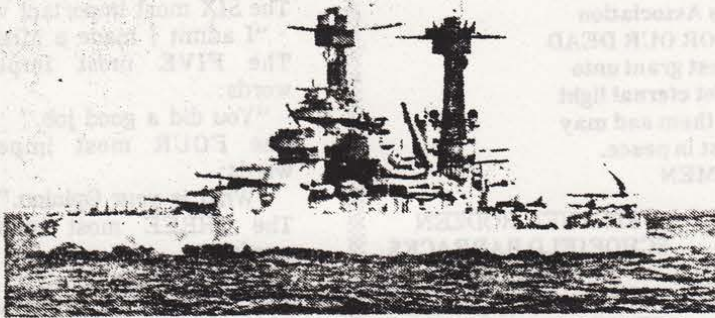

USS TENNESSEE (BB-43)



The fifth TENNESSEE (BB-43) was launched April 30, 1919, under the sponsorship of Miss Helen Lenore Roberts, daughter of the Governor of Tennessee, and the ship was commissioned June 3, 1920.

To man the Tennessee, the Navy carried out a novel recruiting program, procuring nearly all the enlisted personnel from the state of Tennessee. "A gun's crew from each town" was the slogan adopted.

On the morning of the seventh of December in 1941, the USS Tennessee was in battleship row at Fort Island in the center of Pearl Harbor. Immediately after the attack commenced, her guns were manned and five Japanese planes attacking her were shot down. A bomb struck the left gun of Turret Number Two. Another

pierced the top of Number Three. Because of the burning oil on the water, Tennessee, dodged between other vessels, churned the water with her propellers to keep the flames away.

Tennessee was far more fortunate than most of the ships at Pearl Harbor that day. Able to proceed under her own power, she steamed to Bremerton, Washington, late in December, 1941, for immediate repairs. She became an important unit in Task Force One during the Battle of the Coral Sea, the Battle of Midway, and the Invasion of the Solomons.

In August 1943, Tennessee carried the flag of Commander of Battleship Division Two. On the 2nd and 15th of August joined in the bombardment of Kiska, which on the 15th was seized by

our troops without opposition.

The twenty-second of November 1943, found the Tennessee in the vicinity of Tarawa. A submarine was driven to the surface by a depth charge attack, and Tennessee's five inch guns scored numerous hits before a destroyer finished the job by ramming the crippled sub. When Tennessee left the area, Tarawa was an American Atoll.

The Marshall Islands came next. The Tennessee steamed for Kwajalein after intensive rehearsals at San Clemente Island off the coast of California. On January 31, 1944, the bombardment of the islands of Roi and Namur began. When the troops landed, there was only meager resistance.

After a quick reloading of ammunition and supplies, the ship proceeded to Eniwetok. She proceeded to Engebi in the North of the Atoll, bombarded on the seventeenth of February, and covered a highly successful landing by the Marines on the following day.

Tennessee also took a big part in the action of Admiralty Islands, Saipan Island, and Tinian Island. The ship was working close ashore in the narrow Saipan Channel watching for any indication of enemy activity. The main and secondary batteries were firing, when three carefully camouflaged six-inch guns on Tinian opened on her. The first salvo was over, the second short; but the third found its target. Alert spotters saw the flashes and before another salvo could be fired, the Japanese guns were silenced by the ship's five inchers. But one shell of the third salvo had pierced a five-inch mount. Many were seriously injured and eight men were killed.

The Tennessee and other ships bombarded Anguar Island, an important Japanese phosphate center, until defenses were in ruins and our troops swarmed across the island with little opposition.

Tennessee entered Leyte Gulf on October 20th and began the bombardment on the eastern shore of Leyte where landings were made the next day under cover of naval fire.

The battle of Surigao Strait was the only battle in which battleships, cruisers and destroyers were opposed. It was a great naval engagement in

every sense of the work. Two battleships, two cruisers and four destroyers were lost by the Japanese, while the only American casualty was damage to the destroyer USS Grant.

February, 1945, found the Tennessee defending Iwo Jima. One of her assignments was the destruction of four revetted and camouflaged major caliber defense guns on a ledge on the now famous Mount Suribachi — the job was accomplished.

Now, the Tennessee prepared for the final great operation of the war — Okinawa in the Ryukyus, a chain stretching southwest from the home island of Japan.

On the 12th of April, the kamikaze attacks were unusually heavy. Seven planes which had penetrated the patrol chose the Tennessee as their target for coordinated attack. Six were shot down and fell into the sea, but the seventh, weaving through smoke, came in though hit repeatedly. The Kamikaze, carrying a bomb, crashed on the starboard side of the ship. Twenty-six men were killed and injured, 60 so seriously that they had to be transferred to a hospital ship.

The closing assignment of the Tennessee was to cover the landing of troops at Waykayama, Japan, in the occupation of the empire.

USS TENNESSEE (BB-43) joined the Philadelphia Group of the Sixteenth Fleet (Inactive) at the Philadelphia Naval Base on Dec. 8, 1945. She remained in reserve until March 1, 1959, when her name was struck from the Navy list. She was sold for scrapping in July 1959.

USS TENNESSEE (BB-43) earned 10 battle stars for her service in the Pacific.

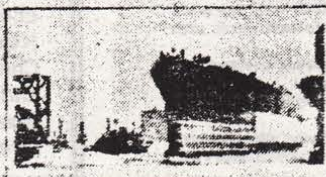

PEARL HARBOR MEMORIAL PLANNED FOR TEXAS

A memorial marker will be dedicated to the servicemen and women, who lost their lives at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, on December 7, 1975 in City Hall Park, El Paso, Texas.

Ernie W. Totten (Hickam Field) is chairman of the memorial dedication and is a member of Paso del Norte Chapter No. 7.

He said after the National Anthem, presentation of colors and invocation, introductions will be made and will include the Pearl Harbor Survivors' motto and preamble to their constitution. 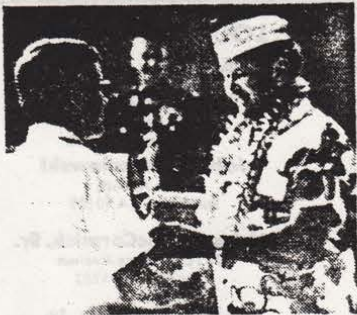

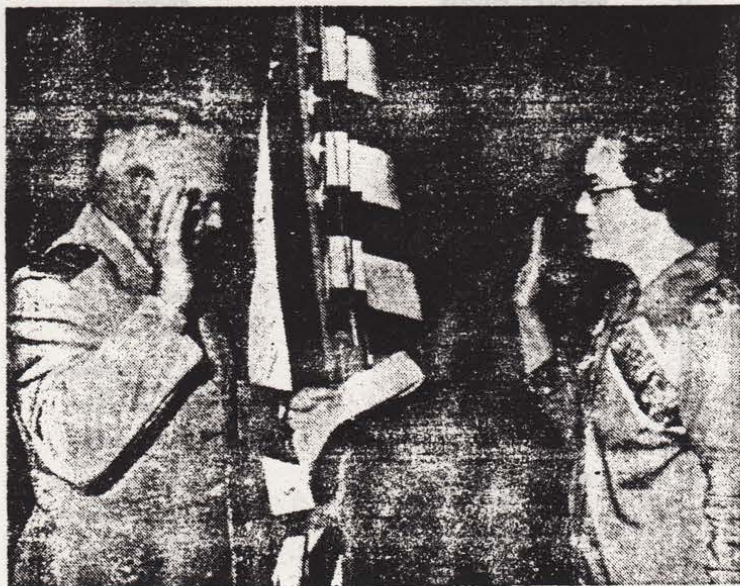
PHSA "IRON MAN AWARD"

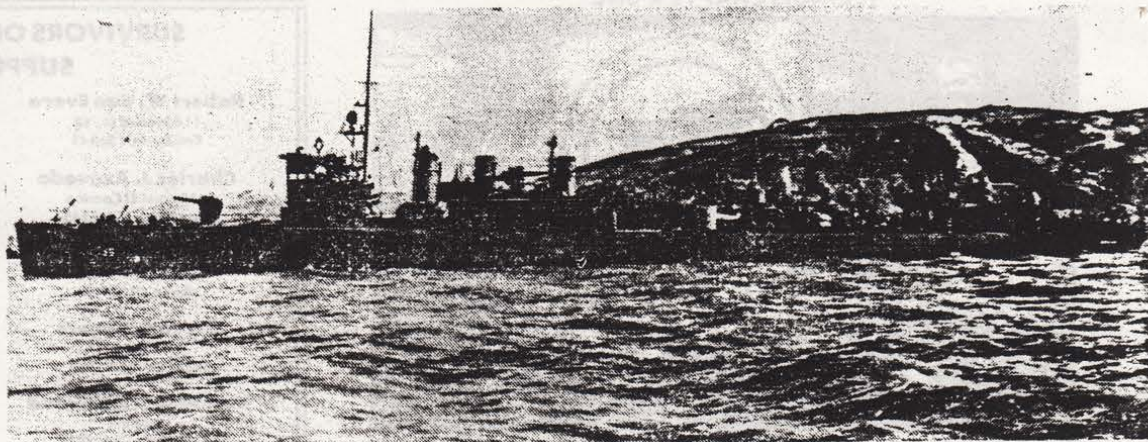

The event took place August 28, 1975 in the commanding officer's office of the Navy-Marine Reserve Building, Alameda, California.

USS WASMUTH (DMS-15)



The minesweeper USS WASMUTH (DMS-15) was converted from a destroyer (DD-338).

The WASMUTH (DD-338) had her keel laid August 12, 1919 at the Navy Yard, Mare Island, California, and was launched September 20, 1920. She was placed out of commission July 26, 1926, recommissioned March 11, 1930, and reclassified DMS-15 on November 19, 1940.

During World War II the minesweeper was escorting a convoy in a raging gale thirty miles off the Aleutians when two depth charges were wrenched from their racks by the waves. The depth charges exploded under the WASMUTH's fantail and carried away a portion of the ship's after section. The inevitable occurred and the

DMS-15 began to sink into the water. Despite the opposing seas, the tanker USS Rampapo came alongside the stricken ship and waged a three and a half hour battle with the raging waves while removing the crew. Nine officers, one hundred and twenty-five men, and two passengers were transferred to the tanker with only superficial injuries. After the heroic rescue on December 27, 1942 the WASMUTH was abandoned.

The WASMUTH earned one battle star on the Asiatic-Pacific Area Service Ribbon for her participation in the attack on Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941.

Statistics of the USS WASMUTH (DMS-15): length - 314 feet, beam - 30 feet,

displacement - 1,190 tons, speed - 35 knots, and her complement was 166 (officers and enlisted men).
